■ast June I was approached by my faculty mentor and dear friend Dr. Brad Griffin with an idea. Since a traditional thesis project on campus was no longer possible because of COVID-19, the theatre faculty proposed an original project involving international collaborators. That was it. There was no script, no cast, and no official collaborators. While some may have been intimidated by such a vague proposal, I immediately jumped at the opportunity. Being both Mexican and Jewish, I knew that I wanted to tap into my roots and reach out to artists in both Mexico and Israel. But what story would we share? This summer, as racial tensions rose in America and all eyes were focused on the Black Lives Matter movement, I found myself particularly intrigued by what I was witnessing among my peers and, more broadly, young people across the country. Suddenly, I saw people who had never demonstrated any interest in activism speaking up about political issues on social media. I became fascinated with this newfound spark among my generation. I found myself wondering, what is our role as young people in this country? And what commonalities do we share with the young people of other countries who are dealing with their own social turmoil? These questions became the centerpiece of *Allegories* of Our Youth, which consists of a series of vignettes in which the company members explore their individual roles in their home country through unique performance styles. Throughout this devising process, I have learned so much about the universality of wanting to fight for a better future. As you watch, I invite you to consider what your role is in your home country, and I'm certain you will find some commonalities with our company.

Jesús Quintero (Collaborator) is the executive director of Tijuana Hace Teatro in Tijuana, Mexico. A graduate of the theatre program at Mexico's National Fine Arts Institute (INBA), he has worked in producing, audience engagement, teaching, directing, performing, and more. Quintero has extensive global experience as an artist, speaker and programmer: International Festival of the Bilingual Foundation of the Arts (Los Angeles); Theatre Communications Group National Conference (San Diego); ITI World Congress (Armenia); Theatre Communications Group's Audience (R) Evolution Convening (Kansas City); Theater Bay Area Conference (San Francisco); Agor Drysau/Opening Doors (Gales); Festival Internacional ¡A Trote! (Mexico City); Fira de Teatre Infantil Juvenil de les Illes Balears (España); Encuentro de las Américas (Los Angeles); and the International Association of Theatre for Children and Young People (ASSITEJ) Artistic Gathering (Beijing).

Ramón Verdugo (Collaborator) is the artistic director of Tijuana Hace Teatro in Tijuana, Mexico. As an actor, director, and producer, he has collaborated in over 30 shows. He is a professor of theatre at Universidad Autónoma de Baja California and also a professor of acting for opera singers at Escuela Escénico Vocal Ja'sit. Verdugo has extensive international experience participating in seminars, conferences, and festivals such as the Next Generation Programme of the International Association of Theatre for Children and Young People (ASSITEJ) (China), Odin Week Festival (Denmark), Fira de Teatre Infantil I Juvenil (Spain), ITI World Congress (Armenia), amongst others in Mexico, United States, and Argentina. Over the past ten years, Verdugo has worked closely with his binational community where he has co-directed and produced the Binational School of Audiences program and the Festival Interprepas for young theatre groups in Tijuana. He is also the co-founder of the Festival de Teatro Íntimo and has collaborated with The Old Globe (San Diego) in its community program coLAB.

Parra toured for one year in the international leadership program *Up With People*. Her passion for theater and acting allowed her to find a love for stage managing, working in her school productions such as *The Wolves*, *Sister Cities*, *Seascape with Sharks and Dancer*, and many more.

Juliet Johnson is a sophomore theatre arts major with an acting emphasis from Ventura, CA. Johnson's on-campus performances include last year's Dance in Flight as well as this year's upcoming virtual Dance in Flight.
