A NOTE ABOUT THE PROGRAM

Students, faculty, parents, neighbors, and friends, welcome to our 2021 Christmas Concert! We are so delighted to return to live performance after such a long time away. While we have been eager to keep our communities safe, the performing arts have been especially hindered by the distance learning and continued COVID risk mitigation efforts. As we continue our journey back to live performing, we are learning to cope with outdoor lessons and rehearsals, wearing masks while singing and playing, and rigorous testing. The instrumental program in particular has had to cancel and delay several performances, including the presentation of concertos by our talented students who auditioned in 2019 and 2020. You will notice that tonight's program includes repertoire that would normally be included at other times during the year so that we might "catch up" with some much-needed instrumental performance opportunities. We are honored to support our instrumental music students and especially our concerto competition winners. Among our Christmas literature is the presentation of Gerlad Finzi's Et In Terra Pax (for chorus, orchestra, and soloists). This captivating music is cinematic in quality and takes us on a journey back to the very first Christmas:

A series of tragedies profoundly affected Finzi in his early years. By the time he was 18 he had lost his father, three elder brothers and his much-loved music teacher, killed in action. This dreadful sequence of events, and the appalling losses of the First World War that formed the backdrop to his adolescence, gave Finzi an acute awareness of the impermanence of life, confirmed with grim finality when at the age of 50 he discovered that he was dying of leukaemia. These experiences to a large extent account for the hint of melancholy underlying much of his music.

Finzi's musical inspiration sprang primarily from his love of literature and the English countryside—the same sources that inspired Elgar and Vaughan Williams. *Et In Terra Pax* was composed in 1954 and was almost the last piece that Finzi wrote, though its genesis can be traced to an event some 30 years previously, when one Christmas Eve he had climbed up to the

church at the top of his beloved Chosen Hill, between Gloucester and Cheltenham. The sound of the midnight bells ringing out across the frosty Gloucestershire valleys evidently made a lasting impression on him, retrospectively providing the idea for *Et In Terra Pax*, as he told Vaughan Williams.

The work is a setting of two verses from Robert Bridges' fine poem, "Noel: Christmas Eve, 1913," subtitled *Pax hominibus bonae voluntatis* (*Peace and goodwill to all men*), which Finzi imaginatively and skilfully uses to frame St. Luke's account of the angels' appearance to the shepherds. *Et In Terra Pax* is subtitled "Christmas Scene," and Finzi explained that "*the Nativity becomes a vision seen by a wanderer on a dark and frosty Christmas Eve in our own familiar landscape*." This placing of the biblical story into an English pastoral context is entirely consistent with Finzi's close affinity with the English Romantic tradition, and his lifelong dedication to the creation of his own rural paradise at his home in Ashmansworth, near Newbury.

The two soloists and the chorus have clearly defined musical roles; the baritone soloist takes the voice of the poet, the soprano is cast as the angel, whilst the chorus narrates the familiar biblical text. In the opening section the poet is standing on a hill contemplating the events of the very first Christmas, the sound of the distant church bells becoming for him the sound of an angel choir. This image is expressed in a pealing-bells motif which, together with the refrain from "The First Nowell," provides the musical fabric of the piece.

Finzi, perhaps more than most, must have been aware of the terrible irony of Bridges' reassuring *Pax hominibus* being swiftly followed by the outbreak of World War I, yet despite this, and despite his own terminal decline, *Et In Terra Pax* is a radiant, optimistic work of great beauty and sincerity; a miniature masterpiece that unites emotions, images and the familiar events of the Christmas story into a compelling musical narrative that is at once personal yet universal.

Susannah Gallup is a senior majoring in mathematics and minoring in music. In 2020, she won the Thomas Osborn Concerto Competition at Pepperdine. Gallup is a native of San Diego, where she began playing the violin at age six. In high school, Gallup played in the San Diego Youth Symphony and served as the concertmaster of the Canyon Crest Academy orchestra. She has also performed twice at Walt Disney Concert Hall, through the

Idyllwild Chamber Festival Intensive. Gallup is immensely grateful for the guidance of her private teachers of past and present: Pasha Tseitlin, Michael Tseitlin, and Tamara Chernyak.



Yoona Lee is a senior flutist and piccolo player at Pepperdine University, majoring in music with an emphasis in flute performance, and is a single-subject teacher candidate. Lee started her musical career on piano at the age of four and started to pursue her flute career at the age of eight. She began her studies with Grace Lee and continued her musical growth under William "Bill" Robey. At Pepperdine, she was the winner

of the 2021 Thomas M. Osborn Concerto Competition under the tutelage of Susan Greenberg. She has taught in Southern California as an educator, such as in Santa Monica, Beverly Hills, and Fullerton. She is currently a flute coach in the DongShin Youth Symphony and Korean American Youth Symphony, where she previously held principal positions. While an educator, Lee is also an avid orchestra musician throughout California and England at Walt Disney Concert Hall, Royal Albert Hall, and St. George's, Hanover Square, with musical artists such as Eric Nam and Brian McKnight, David Benoit, and Alpin Hong. Lee has also worked with Jasmine Choi and Jim Walker.
