DIRECTOR'S NOTE

In Anais Mitchell's musical *Hadestown*, Hermes says of the musician Orpheus, "he had a gift to give: he could make you see how the world could be, in spite of the way that it is." I have returned to this text time and again during the past two years, and it has helped sustain me during this season of uncertainty, discord, and profound loss.

Producing opera during COVID-19 has required a great deal of imagination, hope, and faith. During last year's virtual production of *Cendrillon*, no two performers were ever in a room together. This year, we lost an entire week of in-person staging due to COVID-19, and at the time I am writing these notes in mid-February, we have not had a single rehearsal where every cast member was present. Several principal characters and key members of our production team were out for weeks at a time. Cast and crew had to remain masked through all of our rehearsals, and our orchestra rehearsed outside in tents, battling cold, wind, and rain. And yet, our production has pushed on, keeping sight of how this show could be possible, in spite of the challenges along the way.

The characters in *Le Nozze di Figaro* also imagine a world that could be, one in which the Count is redeemed. The means of his redemption are profound. The work ends with a unison chorus stating, "only love can end this day in happiness," a moral that for many years seemed trite to me. I have come to realize it is a bold statement in the context of the play. While the Count does repent at the end of the opera, it is grace that redeems him, and in many ways the entire opera. Only the Countess' forgiveness, a profound act of love toward one who wronged her, makes the better world she imagined truly possible.

We hope you enjoy getting to know these characters, and in some small way, get a glimpse of what could be.

ARTISTIC STAFF

Dr. Keith Colclough (Stage Direction & Musical Preparation) is in his eighth year of teaching at Pepperdine, where he serves as Assistant Professor of Voice and Director of Opera. Past directing credits at Pepperdine include *Gianni Schicchi*, *Dido and Aeneas*, *Die Fledermaus*, and a virtual production of Massenet's *Cendrillon*. Colclough also directs the vocal side of the Heidelberg Summer Music Program, performing with Pepperdine students throughout Austria and Germany. In addition to his duties at Pepperdine, he maintains a studio of professional voice students and performs with local arts organizations. Colclough has been a soloist the Los Angeles Philharmonic, Opera Santa Barbara, Sacramento Philharmonic and Opera, Pacific Opera Project, LACMA Sundays Live, Salastina Society, and the Santa Barbara Choral Society. Colclough is an alumnus of the Flora L. Thornton Opera Program at Pepperdine. Colclough's additional training includes vocal fellowships at the Tanglewood Music Center, Music Academy of the West, the Aspen Opera Center, Fall Island Vocal Arts Seminar, and a Fulbright Scholarship to Germany.

Dr. Pierre Tang (Conductor) oversees the instrumental ensemble program, directs the orchestra and wind ensemble, and serves as the conductor for the annual musical theatre and opera productions at Pepperdine University. Selected presentations of his scholarly research include the Oxford Conducting Institute International Conference in Sydney, Australia, the World Association for Symphonic Bands and Ensembles in Prague, Czech Republic, and the

California All-State Music Educators Conference in Fresno, California. Raised in Hong Kong, he is a sought-after guest conductor and clinician for instrumental and vocal ensembles internationally. Tang teaches annual conducting workshops and directorship seminars in Hong Kong, including the most recent one focusing on orchestra as an operatic accompaniment. Tang also served as the Director of Music at St. Matthew's United Methodist Church in Newbury Park, California. Before his orchestral pursuits, Tang completed master's degrees in both wind conducting and choral music, and specialized in piano performance at the Chinese University of Hong Kong. His principal teachers include Donald Schleicher, Andrew Megill, Chester Alwes, Linda Moorhouse, Stephen Peterson, Dennis Helmrich, and Julie Kuok, and has participated in master classes led by Joseph Flummerfelt, H. Robert Reynolds, Jerry Junkin, Larry Rachleff, Osmo Vänskä, etc. As a vocal coach, collaborative pianist and period keyboardist, Tang has worked with such renowned musicians as Joseph Flummerfelt, Roberto Abbondanza, Alois Gläßner, Jacques Mauger, and Eric Aubier, among others. Recent performances as keyboardist include St. Michael's Church in Vienna, Alice Tully Hall of Lincoln Center in New York, Chicago Symphony Center, and in the Krannert Center as continuo organist for the Illinois Bach Academy led by Andrew Megill, Nancy Wilson and Robin Leaver.

Craig Colclough (Assistant Director/Bartolo) Following his notable role debut as Alberich in *Das Rheingold* with the Tiroler Festspiele Erl during the summer of 2021, Colclough travels back west of the Atlantic for a varied season on stage and in concert. He returns to the roster of the Metropolitan

Opera to sing Monterone in a new production of *Rigoletto*, and makes his house debut with Lyric Opera of Chicago as the title role in *Macbeth*. He also returns to the Royal Opera House Covent Gardens reprising his role as Telramund in Wagner's *Lohengrin*. This summer will see Colclough essay the title roll in Sondheim's *Sweeney Todd* with the Saratoga Opera Festival as well as the role of Leporello in *Don Giovanni* with the Ravinia Festival. During the COVID-19 impacted 2020–2021 season, Colclough was named a recipient of the Eva and Mark Stern Artist Award from the Los Angeles Opera, where he will return next season as Figaro in *Le Nozze di Figaro*. Colclough lives with his wife and three children in Claremont, California.

Kelly Todd (Choreographer) is in her eighth year as a professor at Pepperdine and is so grateful to be working on live theater again. She has directed and/or choreographed many Pepperdine productions including *Ragtime* and *Curtains*. She is the 2014 Ovation Award Winner for Best Choreography for her work on *Lysistrata Jones* at the Chance Theater, where she was a resident artist for 15 years. Some of her favorite credits there have been *West Side Story*, for which she received the L.A. Drama Critics Circle 2012 Special Award for Fight Choreography, and both *Triassic Park* (2013) and *Jerry Springer: The Opera* (2011), which won the Ovation Awards for Best Musical in an Intimate Theater and garnered her Ovation Award Nominations for Best Choreography. She was named Southern California's Choreographer of the Year in 2011 and 2012 by *Stage Scene L.A.* Other credits include *A Christmas Carol*, *Sweeney Todd*, *Once*, *Light in the Piazza*, *Ivy and Bean*, *The Musical*, *Peter Pan*, and *Seussical* at South Coast Repertory; *The Who's*

Tommy at Segerstrom Center for the Arts; and two world premieres, *Keep Movin' On*, featuring the music of Sam Cooke, and *What's Going On*, featuring the music of Marvin Gaye. Before working professionally in theater, Todd spent close to 20 years as an arts educator. For 17 years, each summer she worked with the Children's Civic Light Opera, ages 6–16, and the Young Adult Civic Light Opera, ages 16–23, choreographing and directing over 20 musicals including *Grease*, *A Chorus Line*, *Annie*, *Chicago*, *Crazy for You*, and *Thoroughly Modern Millie*. She taught high school dance, drama, and math for the Los Angeles Unified School District (LAUSD) for five years at Washington Prep High School in South Central Los Angeles and Venice High School in Venice and has worked for numerous non-profits in Los Angeles and New York City using original musical theater works as a way to build student performance in school and leadership skills for life. Todd wants to thank Keith and the music department for welcoming her into this opera family.

David Fraley (Rehearsal Pianist) is a recent graduate of the Pepperdine Music Department, and is a pianist and music director in the Greater Los Angeles area. He was piano-conductor of *Big Fish* at Pepperdine (2017), and co-music director and piano-conductor of *Sweeney Todd* at Conejo Players Theatre (2019), for which he won Outstanding Musical Direction from Four Star Theater Alliance. For five years, Fraley has music directed *Contempo*, the Pepperdine musical theatre ensemble. Aside from the proud work he does as a pianist for local churches, Fraley currently gives private lessons and works as a choral and instrumental coach and accompanist.

Paul J. Dufresne (Set Designer) is a scene designer for theatre and opera based in Los Angeles. Dufresne received his master's degree from Boston University in scene design where he studied under the mentorship of international scene designer James Noone. Selected opera design credits include *Hydrogen Jukebox*, *Le Nozze di Figaro*, *Pelleas et Melisande*, and Tobias Picker's *Dolores Claiborne* among others. Dufresne has worked as assistant designer to James Noone for *Man of La Mancha* at the English National Opera; *La Rodine* with the Minnesota Opera; and *Ghosts of Versailles* at Glimmerglass Opera Festival. Recently Dufresne has worked with the Road Theater on the Ovation-nominated production *Nowhere On the Border* and on a tour of *Destiny of Desire* at Cincinnati Playhouse in the Park, Milwaukee Rep, and the Guthrie with L.A. scene designer Francois Pierre-Couture. Dufresne is on the faculty of the Pepperdine theatre department teaching design.

Julie Cowger (Lighting Designer) is an artist based in Los Angeles. Cowger received her undergraduate degree from Pepperdine University in theatre and music in 2018. She is currently the Assistant Lighting Supervisor & Lighting Programmer for the Geffen Playhouse in Westwood.

Matthew K. Westman (Sound Designer) graduated from the Pepperdine theatre program in 2018 with a bachelors of arts in theatre production and design, sound design and stage management emphasis. At Pepperdine, he worked on *The Abode* (Lighting Designer/Technical Director), *The Pirates of Penzance* (Stage Manager), *Big Fish* (Sound Designer), *Don Giovanni* (Assistant Stage Manager/Deck Manager), and *Into the Woods* (A2) among other shows.

Professionally, Westman has been the Assistant Stage Manager for Rogue Artists Ensemble's Señor Plummer's Final Fiesta and Independent Shakespeare Co.'s *Two Gentlemen of Verona*. Westman also spent a year as an Assistant Stage Manager for the Royal National Theatre in London. Currently, Westman is the Technical Production Manager at Reason One Productions, Inc., a Los Angeles-based production company, as well as the Production Manager at Eagle Rock Baptist Church in North East Los Angeles.

Sarah Lindsley (Costume Designer) is an artist living in North Hollywood and is thrilled to be returning to her alma mater to style the costumes for this year's production of *Le Nozze di Figaro*. Since her days at Pepperdine as a technical theatre student, she has been able to work on a variety of interesting projects; examples include stitching for Harry Potter World—Universal Studios Hollywood, FX's *American Horror Story*, Jägermeister, and Kanye West. She also freelances as a wardrobe hand/set tailor where she has been able to work with St. Vincent, Amanda Lepore, and *La'Official Magazine USA*. From 2019–2020 she was fortunate enough to be part of the National Tour of *Finding Neverland* as Wardrobe Assistant and Wig Master. Currently, she is employed at the Geffen Playhouse in Westwood as their Head of Wardrobe. She would like to give a special thanks to the professors and staff here at Pepperdine for their continuous support of her career in professional theatre, as she would not be here without them. Another special thank you goes out to those who are working ridiculous hours and are remaining vigilant regarding the constant new protocols to keep us safe during this trying time so that we can continue to share the magic of theatre. Lily Bartenstein (Props Designer) is a multidisciplinary designer for theatre and live performance based in Los Angeles. In addition to props, her work includes scenic, video, and lighting design. Recent work includes: *Lizastrata* (props, Troubadour Theatre Company), *Sweat* (scenic design, Long Beach City College), *Zorro x2* (video coordination and editing, Cal Poly Pomona), *Red Ink* (scenic and video design, Playwrights' Arena), and *The Tale of Turandot* (video design, *The Imagine Project*).

Stephanie Coltrin Beyries (Stage Manager) is a Los Angeles-based director, producer, and stage manager. Favorite directing credits include *Henry V*, *The Winter's Tale*, *Macbeth*, *Othello*, *Hamlet*, *The Tempest*, *King John*, *Romeo and Juliet*, *King Lear*, *Julius Caesar*, *The Weir*, *Bach at Leipzig*, *The Last Five Years* (Ovation recommended), *Moonlight and Magnolias*, *Taking Sides*, *Miss Saigon* (Ovation Award Best Musical), *Jesus Christ Superstar*, *Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?*, and *Blithe Spirit*. Coltrin has stage managed over 60 productions at companies throughout L.A., including McCoy Rigby (*Fully Committed*), Civic Light Opera of South Bay Cities (*Jekyll and Hyde*, *Ain't Misbehavin'*, *Into the Woods*) Reprise (*She Loves Me*, *Babes in Arms*) McCoy Rigby (*Fully Committed*) *Odyssey*, (*Tea*, *Ali*, *Little Murders*, *Rhinoceros*, Steven Berkoff's *Shakespeare's Villains*), and many others.

Yelena Babinskaya (Production Manager & Technical Producer) is a member of the production design faculty at Pepperdine. She works all over L.A. and the country as a lighting, scenic, and costume designer. She holds an MFA from UCLA and a BA from UNC. Babinskaya is a member of United States Institute for Theatre Technology. She is very excited to be part of this adventure.

Molly Day (Assistant Stage Manager, Cover Marcelina) is a senior music major with an emphasis in voice from Kansas City, MO.
